

Bradley K. Martin spent most of his career as an Asia correspondent and bureau chief for news organizations that included Newsweek, The Wall Street Journal, Bloomberg News, The Baltimore Sun and Asia Times.

Twice nominated for the Pulitzer Prize for his newspaper reporting, he received the 2007 Asia Pacific Special Book Prize for *Under the Loving Care of the Fatherly Leader: North Korea and the Kim Dynasty*.

Following semi-retirement in 2009 he and his wife Susan have divided their time between homes in Nagano, Japan, and Na'alehu, Hawaii. There he continues to analyze developments in North Korea for Global Post and other publications and has been trying his hand at Susan's field, fiction writing. He has just completed a thriller set in North Korea and is seeking a publisher for it.

Brad majored in history at Princeton and attended Emory University Law School. He has been visiting professor of journalism at Ohio University, Louisiana State University and the University of Alaska Fairbanks and currently is the Roger Tatarian lecturer at California State University, Fresno. He was a Fulbright fellow in Japan and Korea, journalist in residence at the East-West Center in Honolulu and at Dartmouth and a professional journalism fellow at Stanford.
