Adolescent Family Life Program

This program uses a home visiting model, in which Case Managers meet with pregnant and parenting teens in their homes and at schools to help them develop educational, personal and parenting goals. Students work on program projects to enhance the program's services. Projects might include: organizing and facilitating workshops for young parents, assisting in organizing an event such as the spring fling event, coordinating a clothing drive, or other creative ways to keep parents engaged.

FAMILY SERVICES

Team Decision Making (TDM)

The project is a child abuse prevention program which utilizes TDM (team decision making) to assist families in crisis. Community representatives who are involved in the TDM process serve as a natural ally and potential advocate for parents. Families are provided with referral services, community resources, and support form community representatives.

MATERNAL HEALTH

San Joaquin/Sierra Regional Perinatal Program

Program provides education, training and technical assistance to birthing hospitals of Region 5, a nine county area of California. The program promotes quality improvement activities to help hospitals enhance and strengthen their services to improve birth outcomes of mothers, babies and families in the San Joaquin valley and Sierra areas of California.

Perinatal Mental Health Integration Project

The primary purpose of this project is to establish comprehensive integrated perinatal mental health system of care in Fresno County through 1) the implementation of the Nurture 2 Nurture consultation service, 2) trainings for medical, health care and behavioral health professionals on perinatal mood disorder screening and treatment protocols, and 3) facilitation of support groups throughout Fresno County to increase access and enhance the quality of perinatal behavioral health services in Fresno County by cultivating effective collaboration between medical, behavioral, and allied health providers. The project added another County site in Madera and is currently working to expand in Northern California.

California Personal Responsibility Education Program (CA PREP)

The California Personal Responsibility Education Program (CA PREP) is a three year teen pregnancy prevention program that is funded by the California Department of Public Health - Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health (MCAH) Program. The purpose of CA PREP is to 1) educate California's most high-risk and vulnerable adolescents on both abstinence and contraception by replicating evidence-based program models that have been proven to change behavior or reduce pregnancy among youth ages 12-19 in Kings County; 2) address at least three adulthood preparation subjects; 3) create family planning clinical linkages; and 4) maintain a community coalition of stakeholders to engage community members in actions that change social norms in order to achieve the following goals:

- Decrease teen pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections
- Support youth's personal growth with meaningful opportunities for enrichment to increase resiliency and self-efficacy to avoid harmful behaviors
- Ensure access to teen friendly family and reproductive health planning services
- Increase community support in the development of healthy youth and the reduction of risky sexual behaviors.

YOUTH DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Lock It Up Project

Project partners with school districts, pharmacies, medical and behavioral health professionals, parents and youth to increase awareness of the risks and consequences associated with illicit use of prescription painkillers by teens and adults ages 12-20 in Fresno County. This community-based project provides information through town hall meetings, outreach events, and media messages to address this issue.

Performing Above the High (PATH) Project

Through a series of community norm change campaigns, the program aims to reduce marijuana use among youth and young adults, ages 12-20, in Fresno County. Program components include: 1) school/community-based prevention education; 2) youth advocacy training; 3) parent education and training; 4) law enforcement collaborations; and 5) community outreach.

Selma High School Reproductive Health Services Project

The project is designed to delay the onset of sexual activity among Selma High School (Fresno County) students and to prevent pregnancies and STD/STI transmission among sexually active teens by implementing an array of activities and providing Family PACT clinical linkage services. Project is funded by the Selma Healthcare District Foundation.
