

AUDITORY LEARNING TACTICS

Auditory learners generally learn best by listening and talking aloud. They typically notice and remember sounds. They are often very adept at remembering things that they hear or say aloud. They also tend to be good with words and language. Auditory learners often read to themselves, either silently or aloud, as they study. They also tend to be distracted by noise and sounds.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Listen attentively to instructions and information given orally. ❖ Sit towards the front of the room ❖ Try to sit towards the front of the room so you can hear well and distractions from windows and doors are minimized. ❖ Consider tape recording the lecture (or consulting with the professor to see if they podcast lectures). ❖ Repeat information silently to yourself when taking lecture notes. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ❖ Rehearse or repeat information from notes or key text material silently in your head or aloud. ❖ Study with a partner and alternate reading to each other, pausing to discuss key concepts in between. ❖ Study in quiet areas to minimize hearing music, television or other distractions. ❖ Tape record yourself summarizing key points, then play the tape as a memory rehearsal strategy. ❖ Use rhymes or jingles, or create lyrics to your favorite song about course material.
