
Your Zip Code Matters, Because Where You Live Impacts How You Live

Where we live in Fresno makes a difference in living outcomes. Part of this is due to a long history of city planning agendas that focused health resources in the north side of town while resources were taken out of other areas. As such, quality and distribution of resources and care remain unequal.


Health Inequalities

BIRTH OUTCOMES

While most mothers in Fresno receive prenatal care, there are still noticeable disparities between neighborhoods. On average, infant mortality rate ranges are lower in Advantaged Neighborhoods than others. Some Southwest neighborhoods can expect as many as 1 in 4 children dying before age 1 while several Advantaged Neighborhoods have no infant mortality.
