Finding the Political Will to Support Parks (Pt. 1): Funding Acquisition and Maintenance

Park development today comprises two realities: (1) communities want safe and accessible parks; (2) cities need revenue to develop and maintain parks. Political will is the public decision to pay the economic and political costs of establishing and managing parks. However, even though benefits of parks are widely acknowledged, parks departments consistently grapple with tight budgets in cash-strapped cities. Revenue can only come from taxpayers, donors, or fees. Everyone loves parks, but no one wants to pay for them. This session will look at strategies that utilize available and innovative tools to overcome these challenges.

Parks and Economic Development

The social benefits of parks are well-documented and easily understood. As destinations for play and recreation, parks have long served as community gathering places and locales for activity and fun. However, the economic benefits of parks are less visible, despite a growing recognition that parks can and do generate real economic benefits for cities. There is growing recognition that parks can and do generate real economic benefits for cities; in 2013, spending at local and regional public parks contributed almost \$140 billion in economic activity and generated nearly 1 million jobs.
